### *Diane Pilkey, RN, MPH (she/her)*



Diane is a Senior Nurse Consultant at the Maternal and Child Health Bureau/Health Resources and Services Administration (HRSA) and the federal project officer for the National Center for Fatality Review and Prevention cooperative agreement. Ms. Pilkey has more than 20 years of experience in public health at the local, state, and federal level, including with the Washington State Department of Health, where she worked as an epidemiologist and the Child Death Review Assessment Coordinator. Ms. Pilkey is a registered nurse who has practiced in both clinical and public health settings in both urban and rural contexts. Her work has focused on children and adolescents, injury and violence, infant mortality, and early childhood. Ms. Pilkey has a master's in public health from the Maternal and Child Health program at the University of Washington Public Health School, a bachelor's in nursing from the University of North Carolina, and a bachelor's in Cultural Anthropology from Duke University.

### *Hadeis Safi (they/them)*



Hadeis is the Manager of Community Programs in the Division of Adolescent and Young Adult Medicine at Lurie Children's Hospital of Chicago and serves as the hospital LGBTQ+ Liaison. With a focus on creating inclusive healthcare spaces, they lead community-facing work, including HIV/STI and Substance Use Prevention outreach. Hadeis is also a driving force behind Lurie Children's "Gender Inclusive Spaces" and "LGBTQ+ Inclusive Spaces" training series. As an advocate for improved health access, they collaborate with local stakeholders and champion equitable care for transgender, non-binary youth, and the broader LGBTQ+ community, embodying a commitment to positive change.

### *Sasha Mintz, MPH (she/her)*



Sasha is a Senior Epidemiologist for the National Center for Fatality Review and Prevention. Her work focuses on providing epidemiological support to users of the National Fatality Review-Case Reporting System and disseminating data using an equity lens. In her eight years working in mortality surveillance and review, she has worked at both the state and national levels, including with the Colorado Violent Death Reporting System and the Colorado Child Fatality Prevention System. She received a bachelor's in biomedical sciences in 2012 from Colorado State University and a master's in public health in 2017 from the University of Colorado.
