Situational Status

On September 8, 2022, the Oregon Office of Emergency Management (OEM) Emergency Coordination Center (ECC) activated to monitor the wildfires, public safety power shutoffs and facilitate information sharing and resource coordination. Evacuation orders are in place for six wildfires. Multiple state agencies and emergency management partners are supporting firefighting and response needs. Resources from two states are providing support through the Emergency Management Assistance Compact (EMAC).

Concerns

- Increasing number and types of incidents
- Increasing incident complexity
- Increasing needs for resources such as fuel or evacuation support for specific incidents
- Availability of resources regionally and nationally to fill resource requests
- Access to equitable information for all populations



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ESF-1 ODOT

- Coordinate evacuation.

ESF-2 Communications

- Manage communication impacts.

ESF-4 Firefighting

- Wildfire suppression support.
- Conduct structural damage assessments.

ESF-6 Mass Care

- Support evacuation shelter operation needs.
- Coordination with food and feeding programs for evacuee support.

ESF-11 Agriculture

- Coordinate needs for domestic and livestock sheltering.
- Monitor impacts to livestock operations and feed availability.

ESF-12 Energy

- Monitor for impacts and potential threats to energy/power/gas infrastructure.
- Mitigate service interruptions and plan for restoration.

ESF-15 Public Information

- Monitor and provide information to inform internal and external audiences with a focus on the public at large.

ESF-18 Military Support

- Coordinate ORNG personnel.
- Support local air crews at fire locations and traffic control points.

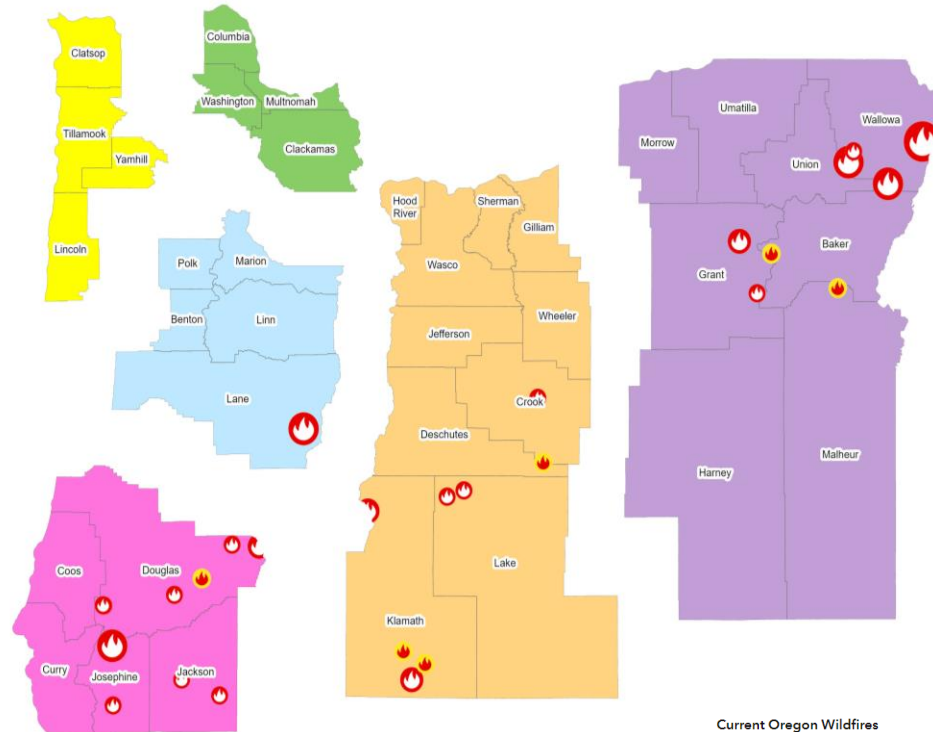
