Situational Status

On September 8, 2022, the Oregon Office of Emergency Management (OEM) Emergency Coordination Center (ECC) activated to monitor wildfires and public safety power shutoffs, and facilitate information sharing and resource coordination. Evacuation orders are in place for six wildfires. Multiple state agencies and emergency management partners are supporting firefighting and response needs. Resources from two states are providing support through the Emergency Management Assistance Compact (EMAC).

- Mitigate service interruptions and plan for restoration.

 Monitor and provide information to inform internal and external audiences with a focus on the public at large.


