Content of Discussion

I. Welcome and Introductions

Welcome! Those present introduced themselves.

II. Review of Process and Purpose

September 30th, 2010, October 28th, 2010, December 13th, 2010 and January 24th, 2011 work to date, including the Context Map, Cover Story Vision, and SWOT Analysis were reviewed.

III. Minnesota Model Presentation by Anne Willaert

Discussion following the presentation revolved around the importance of bringing different representation including nurses, social workers, and the Indian Health Board. The group brought up the importance of addressing the involvement of CHWs and the increase of utilization of hospital resources as well as maintaining a relationship with primary care providers and all parties involved. In addition, the group expressed concern over sustainable funding stream sources and problems

with recruitment, retention, utilization, and supervision of CHWs. The group decided that the subcommittees would be the best way to begin that discussion in more depth.

The Council also had questions about offering curriculum in various languages versus assuring that CHWs are bilingual and have culturally competent trainers. In the Minnesota Model, the curriculum has only been offered in English. The Council suggested the possibility of offering tests in various languages to identify if CHWs are able to provide services in other languages. The conversation has been tabled to further discussion in the subcommittees.

IV. Policy Implications for Oregon

How does Oregon move forward to begin elaborating a process to inform and shape policy that is supportive of CHWs?

The CHW Policy Advisory Council will now transition into separate subcommittee groups with specific hoped-for outcomes (bulleted)

- 1. Standards and Competencies
 - Standardization of the CHW profession, including core competencies, functions, and position integrity across health care models.
- 2. Funding and Sustainability
 - Sustainable funding plan that includes statewide policy initiatives for funding and public/private partnerships.
- 3. Advocacy and Empowerment
 - Fully developed plan for community engagement to inform and advocate for CHW policy platform and incorporation of CHW model within health care systems.
- 4. Education, Training, and Evaluation
 - Fully developed and codified educational curriculum that is accepted by academic health education institutions.
 - Research and evaluate best practice models with an emphasis on financial return on investment and workforce development.

V. Introduction of Guadalupe Guajardo

The Office of Multicultural Health and Services received support from the Northwest Health Foundation to work with Guadalupe Guajardo, who will facilitate the work of the four subcommittees.

VI. Overview of Process Moving Forward

Process Description: Guadalupe facilitates the four subcommittee groups and assist them in meeting their outcomes.

Each work group will be comprised of committee members and two leads. The group determined that it is important that one of the leads of each subcommittee be a community health worker.
