The meeting will include a presentation by COCC Library and the Des Chutes Historical Museum staff about the local historical resources available at their institutions that support the research and writing of local history. Learn about the process of writing an OE entry with a presentation by Kelly Cannon-Miller, historian and Director of the Des Chutes Historical Museum. Ms. Cannon-Miller will use her current research on the Bowman Museum in Prineville as an example of how to research and write for The OE. Bill Lang, OE Executive Editor, will work with participants to identify central Oregon topics that should be included in the Encyclopedia.
