ABOUT BEAVERTON

Nestled in the heart of the Tualatin Valley, midway between majestic Mt. Located just seven miles west of Portland in Washington County, Beaverton is the sixth largest city in Oregon and is home to a population of nearly 92,000.

COMMUNITY Beaverton is a family-friendly city well known for its many attractive and well-planned neighborhoods. There is a strong sense of community here, due in part to active citizen participation. Residents also enjoy easy access to excellent medical care, one of the state's top libraries, a variety of cultural programs, the Portland metropolitan west side's largest shopping district and dozens of churches serving all denominations.

CITY GOVERNMENT The City of Beaverton has a strong-mayor form of government. The Mayor is the executive and administrative head of the government of the city, and presides over the five-member City Council. The Mayor and City Councilors are elected at large to serve four-year terms.

TRANSPORTATION Centrally-located and easily accessible from every direction, Beaverton is served by Highway 26 and Highway 217, and is only minutes from I-5. Frequent bus, light-rail train and commuter rail line service provide public transportation.

EDUCATION Families in Beaverton are served by outstanding public schools. The Beaverton School District has been nationally recognized for its innovative programs as well as high student and staff achievement. In addition, Oregon's best private schools are located within minutes.

RECREATION The beaches of the Oregon coast, the ski slopes of Mt. Hood and the scenic Columbia River Gorge are all within easy reach at just over an hour away. In Beaverton, residents are surrounded by parks, golf courses, vineyards, forests, lakes and streams that offer a wide range of recreational activities for children and adults.

The Beaverton City Library has two branches—the Main Library and the Murray Scholls Branch. Beaverton City Library is the second busiest library in Oregon, serving a population of approximately 142,000 (Beaverton's population plus a portion of unincorporated residents in Washington County). Each month, more than 84,000 people visit the library to check out nearly 300,000 items—circulating more than 3.3 million items annually. The Main Branch has three divisions: adult, teens and children. Murray Scholls houses more than 40,000 items including books, DVDs, music and books on CDs, videogames, large print books, newspapers, magazines and more. The branch also has eight internet work stations and a wireless bar for laptop users. The Murray Scholls Branch provides popular materials with an emphasis on youth.

Supporting both branches is the Beaverton City Library Foundation and New Friends of the Beaverton City Library. The Foundation was created to support the library by providing funding to enhance its programs and services. During recent years the foundation has increased materials in the large print collection, purchased an adaptive technology station for users with vision impairments, enhanced Young Adult Homework Center programs, and added to the literacy and ESL language collections.

New Friends of the Library is a nonprofit organization that supports and promotes library services in Beaverton through fundraising, strengthening relations between the library and community, and promoting public awareness of the many resources and services the libraries provide. New Friends operates a used book store, The Book Corner, which raises more than \$25,000 per year for the two branches.

This leader is a key member of the Mayor's executive team and knows the challenges often associated with meeting the demand for library services while facing budget pressures, possible cutbacks, controlling costs and raising money.

The successful candidate must possess a MLS or MLIS degree from an ALA-accredited university and must have successful administrative and managerial experience in a comparable-sized public library system or a large branch library in a major system. The candidate must have qualitative experience in the operations and maintenance of automated library management systems, budget analysis, preparation, administration, and public relations; be an effective collaborator who can maintain and build working partnerships with county, city, and state officials and other community entities to ensure the deliverance of effective and desirable services to city residents; must also possess strong written and i YfVU"communicatic b skills.

In addition to a Master's degree in @brary Gcience from an American Library Association accredited school, the candidate shou'X have a minimum of 12 years' experience as a professional librarian in a full service library, including five years in a senior management role. An equivalent combination of education and experience enabling the incumbent to perform the essential functions of the position will also be considered.
