

Banned Books/Censorship









- NC elementary school parents objected to a teacher's reading of "gay-themed" King and King, which was used to address bullying in his classroom.
- Coeur d'Alene (ID) school may reclassify <u>Of Mice and Men</u> as an optional ninth grade reading book because parent objected to its usage of profanity.
- The Brunswick County School District (NC) rejected <u>grandmother's second</u> challenge to Sherman Alexie's The Absolutely True Diary of a Part-time Indian.
 - A former superintendent said the book gives teens "coping skills and hope for dealing with these tough issues in their own lives."
- In preparation for celebrations surrounding the defeat of Germany in WWII, the award-winning graphic novel <u>Maus</u> has been <u>removed from bookstores</u> in Russia because it features a swastika on the cover.
- A religious nonprofit sues Wake County for its <u>purported discriminatory library</u> meeting room policies.
- The creator of the 3-D printed gun challenged a letter from the State Department that demanded <u>he</u> remove blueprints from the Internet.
- Free speech versus hate speech-exceptions to the first amendment?
- <u>Unintended consequences</u> with online algorithms, social media and hate speech.
