

Are transgender children's books the last taboo in


- The We Need Diverse Books spring 2015 booktalking kit is out now.

### **Banned Books/Censorship**

- Citing a lack of support from administrators, <u>a teacher and assistant principal in North</u>
   <u>Carolina resigned</u> after parents complained about the teacher reading <u>King & King</u> to his 3rd grade class.
- A California college student wants to ban four graphic novels <u>because she "expected Batman and Robin, not pornography."</u>
- Italian-Americans want to <u>ban books about Al Capone from children's reading lists in</u> NYC schools because they perpetuate negative stereotypes.
- Last year the South Carolina legislature <u>punished two colleges</u> for assigning <u>Fun Home</u> and other "gay-themed" books. This year <u>the musical version won five Tony Awards</u>.
- A nonprofit organization called Parents ROCK wants to remove The Bluest Eye,
   Beloved: A Novel, Killing Mr. Griffin, and Dreaming In Cuban from school libraries.
- A NC high school parent will appeal school system's decision to retain The Kite Runner by Khaled Hosseini.
- As the statistics site <u>FiveThirtyEight</u> found, asking what is <u>the most banned book in America</u> can very difficult to answer.
- Vermont's statewide reading program, Vermont Reads, <u>sparks discussion</u>, <u>events</u>, <u>and displays</u>, on censorship and LGBTQ content.

person is predisposed to committing terrorism....

#### **Update:**

#### FLORIDA MAN, ACCUSED OF TERRORISM BASED ON BOOK COLLECTION, SET FREE

This is an update on the above story about the Islamic scholar accused of terrorism because he had a few writings from Islamic extremists among his extensive collection of e-books, roughly 20 titles out of 10,000. "Judge Gregory A. Presnell strongly repudiated the government's argument that Robertson's book collection proved a connection to terrorism. "[T]here was no evidence produced that Robertson ever accessed these particular documents, much less that he took their extremism to heart," Presnell wrote, noting that even had Robertson read the books in question, it would not have constituted evidence of terrorism.
