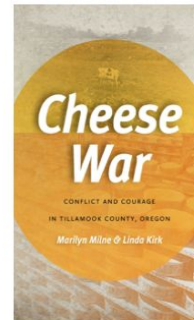

Abstract

Over two million people experience homelessness in the United States, but homeless people are often marginalized by invisibility and stigmas surrounding poverty within their local communities. This research seeks to amplify the voices of Corvallis area homeless women as a means to understand their everyday lived experiences. Six women residing in an emergency overnight shelter were invited to share their life stories through the method of oral narrative. By using a grounded theory approach and qualitative analysis, their narratives were coded and common themes were identified. The major themes that emerged from their life stories include (1) Experiences of Trauma, (2) Barriers to Accessing Services, (3) Motherhood, and (4) What It Means to be a Homeless Woman. The aim of this project was to counter the dominant myths surrounding homelessness through homeless women's own words. With the knowledge of the participant's experiences, it is the hope that the community can better serve this marginalized population.

Abstract

Outdoor School for All! Student Outcomes in Oregon is an ongoing evaluation project of outdoor schools throughout Oregon. The intent of this project is to build understanding and knowledge about the outcomes of outdoor school programming and support program improvement. We built an evaluation system based on legislative requirements, ongoing community engagement, iterative study, a wide variety of data sources and existing literature/knowledge base. Understanding student outcomes, a part of this broad evaluation system, is the focus of this report. Findings are presented here to support many aspects of outdoor school which occur across the state. These include: providing and developing inclusive and equitable programming; authentic and reciprocal community engagement; meeting legislative requirements; providing professional development and learning informed by evaluation; strengthening and diversifying the outdoor school.

Abstract

The use and development of oral history programs has become a popular way for archives to document events and communities, either as a supplement to traditional records or as discrete collections. In particular, projects that focus on involving groups traditionally underrepresented within the archival record are becoming increasingly common in both large institutions and small community archives. This article presents three case studies of oral history projects dedicated to forging ties in the community and increasing diversity in their collections. In these case studies, the authors discuss the inception of their projects and the ups and downs of developing community oral history programs, including building trust, engaging community members, participation of volunteers and students, consideration of alternative models such as story circles, establishment of processes and procedures that can be replicated and sustained, lessons learned and future steps. The authors also reflect on the impact of unexpected roadblocks, particularly the COVID-19 pandemic. By understanding the ways these elements shape oral history programs, archivists can find new ways to frame those programs around the communities in question, creating more inclusive collections and better serving both institution and community.

Abstract

The "Investigating the Relationship Between Social and Sustainable Bonds and Homelessness: A Comprehensive Dataset" provides an in-depth collection of data examining municipal bond issuances and homelessness statistics across various states in the United States. This dataset integrates detailed information on both sustainable and social bond issuances, including issuer names, states, offering amounts, and issuance dates. It also encompasses comprehensive homelessness statistics, presenting annual state-wide homelessness counts, alongside population data to calculate homelessness rates per capita and the percentage change in homelessness year-over-year. Designed to support rigorous analysis, the dataset facilitates exploration of potential correlations between types of bond issuances and homelessness trends. Additionally, it includes a Python script for statistical correlation analysis, enhancing the utility of this dataset for researchers investigating the impact of financial instruments on social issues.

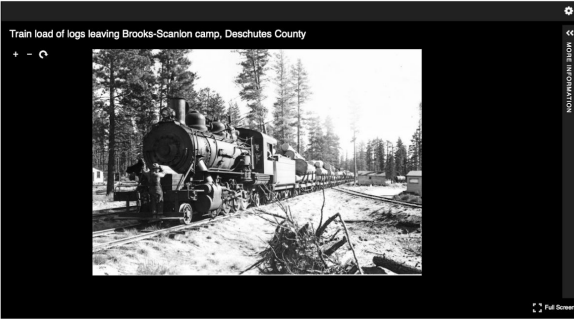

HIGHLY USED BY SCARC

- Oregon Digital is, by far, SCARC's most frequently used tool to assist researchers. Between 2017 (the year SCARC adopted LibAnswers as a reference platform) and 2024, Oregon Digital has been "tagged" 1,206 times.
- Within Oregon Digital, the sets that see the most use are: *The Daily Barometer* (OSU's student newspaper), General Catalogs, yearbooks, and alumni magazines.

WHAT QUESTIONS CAN OREGON DIGITAL ANSWER?

- When was this department, college, fraternity, social club, team sport, etc. established at OSU? [General Catalogs, *The Daily Barometer*, Student Handbooks]
- Who was the first woman to graduate with a Master's degree from the College of Forestry? [Commencement programs, departmental histories, *The Daily Barometer*]
- My grandfather / mother / aunt / brother attended OSU. Do you have any pictures of them? [Beaver yearbooks, *The Daily Barometer*, photographic collections]
- I'm trying to prove my family's ownership of a piece of land. Do you have any photos of our farm on that property? [Aerials]
- I'm looking for the roster of the 1942 Rose Bowl team - where would I find that? [Sports Media Guides]
- Has climate change affected coastal watersheds and resources? [Kelp grove maps, aerials, salt marsh vegetation maps]

Fun search example:

A gentleman passionate about historical shipwrecks off the Oregon Coast visits occasionally from Astoria to look at our nautical maps. Using these maps, he can chart how ocean currents and depths might have affected the final resting place of the sunken ships.
