**Banned Books Week library event:** Censor (THIS): A Banned Books Week presentation with Hand2Mouth Theatre's Youth Devising Ensemble is happening September 21st, from 2-3:30pm at Holgate Library. Check out the booklist that goes with the event.

A little library in Oregon won national recognition: <u>Wendy Shih brings Little Free Diverse</u> <u>Library to Rock Creek community</u> (Willamette Week, 3 min). (**access**)

The U.S. Department of Education weighs in on legislation promoting censorship of library materials: <u>Book bans are not just bad policy; They can raise civil rights issues</u> (4 min). Read more about recent legislation: <u>More states are passing book banning rules. Here's what they say</u> (New York Times, 5 min) and <u>Local no longer: 4 new laws and policies bring book banning to the state level</u> (PEN America, 4 min). (**censorship**, **legislation**)

In Utah, legislation targets specific titles, see <u>Popular and critically acclaimed book titles</u> <u>banned statewide in Utah schools</u> (PEN America, 3 min), <u>Republicans officially enact their most extreme school book ban</u> (New Republic, 3 min) and <u>discussed on NPR</u> (3 min). The Guardian reports on how <u>advocates react to Utah ban</u> (6 min). See also, how <u>lowa schools are responding to a new law</u> banning books (IPR, 15 min). (**censorship**, **legislation**)

Emily Dabrinski contextualizes the impact of new legislation in Idaho: <u>Idaho law criminalizes</u> <u>librarians who Allow LGBTQ books to stay on their shelves</u> (Truthout, 5 min). Related, <u>New lawsuit seeks to stop enforcement of Idaho library materials bill</u> (Idaho Capital Sun, 7 min). Also, the Boise Public Library <u>rejected the first challenge</u> under the new law (Boise State Public Radio, 1 min). (**censorship**, **legislation**)

In contrast, California aims to support freedom to read for all: <u>As LGBTQ library material comes under fire, California may ban book bans</u> (Cal Matters, 17 min). New York Public Library continues to highlight and provide access to banned books: <u>No censorship zone</u>: <u>New York Public Library celebrates books targeted by bans</u> (ABC 7, 2 min). (**censorship**)

Closer to home, a city councilor in Seaside, Oregon proposed patron age restrictions at the Seaside Public Library. He now faces removal from office after a 63-37 recall vote, expected

to be certified by the end of August. <u>Recall holds against Seaside city councilor over</u> <u>potential age restrictions at library</u> (The Astorian, 3 min). (**access, legislation**)

NPR's Code Switch looks at the impact of book bans on Indigenous literature: <u>'Not a badge of honor'</u> (34 min). Authors and publishers at San Diego Comic Con discussed <u>the terrorism of book bans in dividing communities</u> (Comics Beat, 8 min). (**censorship**, **diversity**)

A new <u>short documentary explores Drag Story Hour</u> through the eyes of kids (NBC News, 5 min) - watch the <u>'It's Okay' trailer</u> (YouTube, 2 min). Related, after the Reno Library cancelled drag queen storytime, a partner organization found other venues to host the popular program: <u>Drag queen story hour is back on — but not through Washoe County libraries</u> (Reno Gazette Journal, 2 min). (**diversity**)

Advocacy against censorship continues, see: <u>Students join educators and advocates in effort to reverse book bans</u> (19th, 5 min) and <u>Author Jodi Picoult signs letter urging Ron DeSantis to end 'Dark Night of Censorship' in Florida Schools</u> (People, 5 min). (**censorship**)

A reminder of how libraries strive to connect people with information and resources: <u>The library is a commons</u> (In These Times, 10 min). (**access**)

Publishing continues to struggle to diversify its workforce: <u>'A Lot of Us Are Gone': How the Push to Diversify Publishing Fell Short</u> (New York Times, 12 min). (**diversity**)

This article on a removal of an essay highlights the complexities of freedom of speech and censorship and the power dynamics underlying access to platforms: The cofounder of Guernica on free speech and the retraction of the Israel-Gaza essay (LitHub, 9 min).
