The editors of Scientific American call out the impacts of book bans in this opinion piece: Book bans harm kids (6 min). Teens in North Carolina highlight the merits of reading and concerns about book bans: Book bans and you: How censorship will influence our future (A&T Register, 3 min). A succinct summary of book bans and why access matters: Tucson librarian talks book censorship (Arizona Daily Star, 3 min). (censorship, access)

Challenges and restrictions on access continue in various degrees: In California, a <u>review board deemed potty training books inappropriate for children</u> (KTVZ, 3 min). Confusion arises with the creation of a new section for young adult books in the adult collection: <u>Gillette Library's 'Books Of Shame' headed to adult section</u> (Cowboy State Daily, 4 min). Also happening in Wyoming: <u>Library staff explain juvenile card restrictions</u> (Gillette News Record, 2 min). (**censorship**, **access**)

LGBTQ+ books, authors and groups continue to be targeted: Secret library prompts investigations in Palmyra School District (WGAL, 5 min) and Houston father upset over removal of children's book featuring same-sex parents (Fox26 Houston,1 min). Related, Is 'pornography' available at public school libraries in SLO County? Here's a reality check (San Luis Obispo Tribune, 10 min). Concern about a flier in a library: LGBTQ youth group's Nampa library flyer irks far-right legislator, who helps stir up issue (Idaho Statesman, 5 min). Related, a queer school librarian offers their perspective on challenges to LGBTQ+ titles: I'm a queer school librarian, and book bans enrage me (YourTango, 14 min). (diversity)

States continue to leverage legislation to protect access to library materials, see New Jersey's effort to end the book ban culture war (nj.com, 5 min) and Freedom to Read advocates notch a legal victory in Alaska (Publishers Weekly, 4min). The Tallahassee Democrat covers the impact of recent legislation in Florida: It's famous and among the most-removed books in Florida school districts. What is it? (9 min). (legislation)

Read the PEN America school library report: <u>Banned in the USA: Beyond the Shelves - PEN America</u> Related, <u>Florida again tops the nation in school book removals, according to a report</u> (WUSF, 3 min). (**censorship**)

In a letter to the editor, a New Jersey resident provides a pointed review of Booklooks: <u>"BookLooks" is for Book Haters</u> (Phillipsburg, NJ News, 2 min). (**information literacy**)

Around the world: Pulitzer Prize winner: <u>Is 'The Vegetarian' inappropriate for minors?</u>
<u>School bans spark debate</u> (Chosun Daily, 3 min) and censorship in Canada: <u>The right to read</u> (This, 15 min). (**access**)

The New York Times looks at how pop culture addresses moral panics and conspiracy theories: 'Hysteria!,' 'Stranger Things' and the satanic panic that never goes away (11 min).

Concerns about rewriting of history have emerged at the National Archives: <u>It's going to take</u> a constant fight to preserve the historical record (Current Affairs, 10 min). For more context see <u>Longtime National Archives employees alarmed about censorship</u>, new reporting finds (WBUR, 5 min). (**censorship**)

Other types of restrictions and censorship have greater implications: <u>The censorship of LGBTQ+ content online corresponds with declines in Freedom for Everyone</u> (Tech Policy, 10 min). Online games: <u>Roblox is the latest target of NY state kids online safety bills</u> (Verge, 8 min). In Florida: <u>social media restriction and age verification law accused of speech violations</u> (Tallahassee Democrat, 3 min). And in Texas: <u>This major Texas university is allegedly banning the use of LGBTQ+ language</u> (INTO, 3 min). See also, <u>'Censorship by another name'</u> (National Education Association, 8 min). (**first amendment, inclusion**, **diversity, access**)

The 19th provides insight on how disinformation is an ongoing concern: <u>Voting may be over, but this election worker is still debunking disinformation</u> (8 min). Related, Pew Research released insights and data on the online news landscape: <u>America's News Influencers</u>. (**disinformation**, **information literacy**)

Tech Policy emphasizes the importance of media literacy as AI infiltrates the online landscape: We can't wait for media literacy education in the age of AI (5 min). The AI School Librarians Newsletter unpacks how AI can be used to spread disinformation, especially through pink slime publications, and also can be used to track and identify false claims:
