AI Spotlight

Libraries and AI: In partnership with the New York Public Library, Data & Society has created a four-part series that looks at the social impact of AI: <u>Understanding AI</u>. 404 Media reports on requests at libraries for <u>AI-hallucinated books</u> (404 Media, 5 min). **information literacy**, **disinformation**

Authors continue to fight against the use of their work by AI companies: A thriller writer won against a tech giant. (New York Times, 7 min) and OpenAI is <u>faced with</u> class action lawsuit from authors (Publishers Weekly, 3 min). **copyright**

Concerns continue to grow about the ethical use of AI, especially by minors and with regards to mental health (warning: articles mention suicide): ChatGPT's new parental controls leave kids at risk (Washington Post, 8 min), kids playing with AI think it is real (Guardian, 18 min), and a historian on how ethical use of AI is not up to the user (7 min). Also, N+1 makes the case for eschewing AI: Large Language Muddle (15 min) and Blood in the Machine argues for not readily embracing AI (8 min). ethics, information literacy
