Need for the Rule(s):

This proposed rule change adds language relating to the assessment of a monthly surcharge to Entities who provide a cash incentive to members for opting out of medical coverage. The surcharge is \$100 per month per benefit eligible employee who is electing to opt-out of their employer sponsored medical coverage. The effective date for this rule amendment is October 1, 2016.

Fiscal and Economic Impact:

This proposed rule change will help OEBB offset the medical premium increases that are due to the number of opt-outs that we currently have. The percentage of opt-outs has grown from 4 percent in 2008 to 9 percent in 2015. In March 2013, Willis Towers Watson, OEBB's actuarial consulting firm, estimated the increase in opt-outs and waives had increased OEBB premium rates by 1.5 percent.

Statement of Cost of Compliance:

1. Impact on state agencies, units of local government and the public (ORS 183.335(2)(b)(E)):

Currently, 193 of the 250 entities receiving benefits through OEBB will be impacted by this proposed rule change, as they have members in the MyOEBB benefit management system who opt out of medical coverage. The monthly surcharge may reduce the amount accrued by the entity when an employee elects to opt-out of medical coverage and receives a portion of the contribution.
