WHAT IS THE RARE PROGRAM?

The mission of the Resource Assistance for Rural Environments (RARE) Program is to increase the capacity of rural communities to improve their economic, social, and environmental conditions, through the assistance of trained graduate-level participants.

RARE participants assist communities in the development and implementation of projects focused on improving rural economic conditions. Our participants live and serve in rural communities for 11 months. The RARE Program has placed more than 450 participants and served every Oregon county.



DOES MY PROGRAM QUALIFY FOR RARE?

RARE communities are organizations that have identified specific needs in rural areas. Eligible organizations include public agencies (including city, county, and regional governments); special districts (such as soil and water conservation districts, park and transportation districts); and also non-profit organizations.

[RARE projects](#) typically fall into four categories: community planning, community and economic development, natural resources planning, and community food systems.



HOW CAN MY AGENCY PARTICIPATE?

To host a RARE participant, each community or agency must provide a \$22,000 match towards the placement, training, and support for the full-time RARE participant. RARE Program staff will administer the participant's monthly stipend, medical insurance, and post-service educational award.

To apply, communities must submit a [pre-application](#) to the RARE office by 5:00 PM on April 22nd. RARE placements are contingent on availability of program funding.
