You'll notice you're being asked to report on 'people' as a group, not broken into age ranges. Just report how much everyone read together instead of calculating it for each age range. This change was made to save you time (hopefully).

You'll notice 'pages' is no longer included among the reading goals in this survey. That is because too few libraries use number of pages as a reading goal to make it meaningful to track at the state level.
