Overview of Survivor Investment Partnership (SIP)

- **Developed in partnership with:**
 - Governor's Office
 - The Nine Tribes of Oregon
 - Culturally specific domestic violence and sexual assault (DVSA) providers
 - Partner DVSA providers statewide
- **Tribes and culturally specific organizations know their communities best.**
- **Brought as a policy option package to the Oregon legislature in 2021 session.**
- **Received \$10M investment in the Governor's Recommended Budget.**



SIP Funding is intended to:

- Increase autonomy and resources for providers.
- Provide domestic violence survivors the ability to decide which supports they need.
- Increase accessibility and meaningful financial support for survivors.




SIP Updates


- **With the closing of the 21-23 biennium on June 30, 2023, Intergovernmental agreements, grant agreements and contract amendments for SIP funds were successfully finalized:**
 - The Nine Tribes of Oregon
 - 31 co-located DVSA advocacy agencies
 - 8 culturally specific DVSA organization grantees:
 - Bradley Angle
 - Bridges Oregon, Inc
 - Ecumenical Ministries of Oregon (EMO)
 - Northwest Family Services (NWFS)
 - Oasis Advocacy and Shelter
 - The Immigrant and Refugee Community Organization (IRCO)
 - The Harbor, Inc
 - WomenFirst Transition & Referral Center
- **The Office of Financial Services is processing issuance of \$9,323,723 in SIP funds**



Next Steps and Continued Collaboration

- The ODHS SIP team continues to develop these partnerships and is planning:
 - Quarterly meetings
 - Networks and coalitions through collaboration with the Nine Tribes of Oregon, ODHS Office of Tribal Affairs, and culturally specific DVSA providers
 - 2023-2025 biennium amendments
- ODHS will request quantitative and qualitative data summaries on the impact of SIP funds for survivors, Tribes, DVSA providers and and communities.
